Mayors Update Dec 2011

Where to start, it has been a very busy past month and a half with both personal and council items. I was required to attend to family matters in London, Ont. Upon my return 01 Nov our CAO Mr McCready submitted his resignation, and on the following day 02 Nov I received the resignation of Ms Colebrooke, our Recreation Operations Manager. At our regular council meeting 02 Nov their resignations were accepted, last day of work 03 Nov. As Mayor, and speaking for council, I would like to thank them both for their services and wish them the best for future endeavours.

A big welcome to Mr Bill Halstead. On 15 Nov we entered into an agreement with Bill to be our Interim Chief Administrative Officer, until the village hires a new full time CAO. Mr Halstead brings with him a wealth of knowledge thru 37 years of experience in municipal government. Bill will be on site in the office 2 – 3 days per week, depending on workload, and will work at home as required. Do not hesitate to contact the CAO over any concerns you have within the village.

Council of the day, and the new council, are all aware that our number one priority is water issues. We have had high turbidity counts in the past little while due to rainfall, this is not unusual for the Village of Sayward, and boil water advisories have been given. I would like to emphasize at this time that a high turbidity count does not mean a high bacterial count. There are certain procedures which must be followed by the Village when turbidity count goes up, the first being notification to public health (viha), adjust chlorine levels in the potable water, and when required, issue a boil water advisory. We post notices of boil water advisory and also use the one call system to advise citizens. If you are not on the one call system then please contact the village office and give your phone number to be added.

Well, the elections are over and the electorate has spoken. This election was very close. For those elected to council congratulations. I would like to thank outgoing Councillors Debbie Coates and Rosemary Croteau for their service to the Village. Debbie served on council for six years and Rosemary for three years.

I would like to just say a few words about publication of the Sayward News. Many think that the Sayward News is put together, run off and put on line by the village office, this is not the case. Debbie Coates has been putting the Sayward News together for well over a year. This was never a council position it has always been a volunteer position. Dates are posted when articles must be in for publication in the next issue. The time schedule for inclusion in the next paper is for a reason, there are many hours spent by Debbie, formatting, copying, putting on line, we, in particular myself, should not expect an article in the Sayward News if it is not in on time. Debbie thanks for volunteering and a job well done (Bravo Zulu).

For those travelling over the festive season, drive carefully and come back safe. I on behalf of council and staff would like to wish everyone a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

Inaugural address 2011

Welcome, ladies and gentlemen, to the Inaugural meeting for Village of Sayward council Dec 2011 to 2014.

Name me one place that is located in a more beautiful setting than the Village of Sayward. You open your drapes to a different beauty every day. I can remember my late father-in-law, who was an artist, looking out the window and saying no human can duplicate the beauty that God creates. He was talking about his view in the Village of Sayward. I certainly never heard him say anything like this when we lived in Victoria. When we moved to Sayward we were embraced by the community, experiencing kindness and friendship everywhere we turned.

That was almost 10 years ago. Of course, since that time I've come to see that even in "Shangri La" one must work very hard not just to maintain the status quo, but to make the future better for us all. Local and world -wide economies change, infrastructure ages, roads crumble, research leads to different approaches to environmental and health concerns, and demographics change. Communities that fail to stay current lose both services and population, eventually falling into disrepair. It is incumbent upon every political leader to lead their community in keeping current.

We represent our Village and its constituents. Constituents are not just numbers in a ballot box. They are people with hopes and dreams who, through our actions, or those beyond our control, may or may not be able to remain in the Village they love so much, due to lack of facilities or jobs. There are families that have lived here for generations, but if they are to stay and enjoy their advancing years in Sayward, it is up to us to create an "age friendly" community where supportive services are available for seniors. Also, every community needs young families – they breathe life and vibrancy into a community. They embrace new ideas, and they have the knowledge and skill to execute them. It is up to us to encourage economic development that will provide them with the employment they need so they may stay in Sayward and raise their families.

Council will have the opportunity to learn about innovative approaches used by other communities with similar circumstances by attending different conferences, seminars, and meetings. You will be able to network with local government politicians and gain valuable insight from their experiences, and you will be given the sacred trust of representing our community to the rest of the Province, and even to Canada, through meetings with various ministers and civil servants. You will be the face of Sayward Village, and as such you will determine the level of dignity and respect with which higher government authorities will deal with us and the needs of our community.

This may sound like a tall order, but there is no need to be overwhelmed. There are seminars, conferences, and workshops designed to teach you about being a local government representative that I encourage you to attend. These are the opportunities for council members to gain knowledge and ideas which are not available at Village council meetings. They will help you learn about your role as a politician, about legalities, and process, as well as the funding opportunities and awards programs that staff can apply for. Your attendance will be of benefit not only to you but also to the Village you seek to represent. It is essential that we recognize the importance of these opportunities during budget discussions.

As Mayor, it is part of my role to build an effective team. I will seek to facilitate your political education and your efforts, recognize and utilize your strengths and appoint you to appropriate committees and/or portfolios. Through the individual discussions that we had last week, each of you has expressed to me where your interests lie, and I have endeavoured to place you where you and I feel you will be the most effective. Following are some of the committees and portfolios that we have identified as being important to our community: International students, which will create home-stay opportunities in the community and increased attendance at our school, Tourism and Eco-tourism, Economic development, Green communities, and Age-friendly communities. All Council members are part of the Finance Committee, and Committee of the Whole.

Along with all the exciting committee work comes the more stressful task of setting policies. Members of council have already discussed certain of these tasks and they all lead back to what I consider one of the most, if not the most

important order of business for council, and that is Budget discussions. This is always a difficult process as costs usually exceed funding, 0% tax increases do not keep pace with amortization of the Village's Tangible Capital Assets. Yes, we did make some progress and achieve significant capital improvements over the past 3 years with the assistance of government grant programs. Our major undertakings included the storm water rehabilitation program, an upgrade to the sewer lagoon, and upgrade and installation of the Heating, Ventilation, Air Circulation system in the Kelsey Centre. We will continue to explore opportunities for grants. There are, however, elements of infrastructure that will require upgrading with, or without grants. It will be up to us to establish priorities. Important considerations for the coming year will include water, infrastructure upgrades and capital purchases. We must think ahead, the budget is the road map for the coming years.

The gentleman that took our Oaths of Office is Mr Bill Halstead, who has been hired as our interim CAO. Council will be hiring a new, permanent CAO in the near future, the hiring process will be discussed at our next council meeting. I would certainly be remiss if I did not thank our staff for their loyalty in the past and future. I am a profound proponent of staff professional development. While Council sets policy, it is the staff who implement policy and manage the affairs of the Village. Professional development enables staff to perform to their optimum abilities, improving performance and self-esteem. A fulfilled, and dedicated staff adds to the stability of the Village.

Everyone who ran for Council did so because they love Sayward. As the elected council, you have been entrusted to establish direction for the future well-being of the Village. Remember the people you represent, put their needs above your own, educate yourselves appropriately, and then you will be an effective councillor.

On behalf of the community, thank you council, and on behalf of Council, thank you to the community for allowing us to serve. Last, but definitely not least, thank you to the spouses who support us in our work.

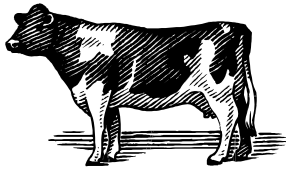

I would like to express my sincere gratitude for another year of amazing generosity from the Bursary Committee and everyone who contributed to it. I think it is amazing that such a small town can piece together such a significant bursary, especially under economic stress. This program has made a very meaningful difference in my finances; this is my third year receiving the bursary and it has cumulatively nearly paid for an entire year of my undergraduate tuition fees.

I have continued in the biochemistry major program at UBC and am now in my third year working on a biology minor with an ecological focus. My goal continues to be to go into education after my undergrad and become a high school math/science teacher with the ambition of modernizing teaching strategies so that students will be better prepared for the rapidly changing world. I really do enjoy studying at UBC, and school is busier than ever with six classes (all in chemistry, biochemistry and biology) as well as a part time job. This year, I started working for the UBC Biology Department as a peer tutor for a first year biology course and I could not have asked for a better opportunity. Two hundred and thirty students are registered in the course and it is taught by my own previous first year professor and good friend, Dr. Norman. This job has been wonderful experience in the classroom setting, and I have even been given the opportunity to give a guest lecture to the class!

This past summer I worked for the City of Vancouver as an outdoor pool/beach lifeguard, at Windsor Stables in Southlands as well as at an organic grocery store. I am happy to say that I started taking riding lessons twelve years ago with Lorna Lupichuck in Sayward and have continued to train at various stables here in Vancouver. Even after having three jobs in the summer and working well over full time hours, it has still been a struggle to afford the cost of living while I am going to school. Receiving the Sayward Bursary for the past three years has helped immensely and as a result I am continuing to do what I love to do. Thank you again to everyone who contributes to the program, and I hope it continues in the future.
