CONDITIONS CHANGE. SO SHOULD YOUR SPEED.

Slow down and drive at a safe speed. Visit ShiftIntoWinter.ca.

A few simple steps could make a difference to your safety:

Know before you go.

First - do you really need to go? Check the current road and weather conditions on DriveBC.ca . Delay travel if conditions are unsafe.

Plan your route ahead of time.

Avoid any roads that may become dangerous during bad weather. If you have to travel:

- Give yourself extra time to get to your destination to avoid rushing.
- Select the safest route.
- Have an emergency plan so if you get stuck, you are prepared. Stay with your vehicle for safety.
- Slow down.

During winter, road conditions change fast, and so should your speed. The posted speed limit is the maximum speed under ideal driving conditions, so when the snow hits, you should slow down and drive with care. Even the most experienced drivers cannot predict how their vehicle will react in snow or on ice

Prepare your vehicle for winter weather.

Install a set of four matched winter tires and keep an emergency kit in your vehicle. Every year, be sure to give your vehicle a pre-season maintenance check-up.

Know how to drive for the conditions before you get behind the wheel.

Don't learn by accident! Winter road conditions vary around the province and can change quickly. You should:

- <u>Always maintain a safe following distance</u> at least four seconds. It takes longer to stop on a slippery road.
- Drop your speed to match road conditions. The posted speed is the maximum speed under ideal conditions.
- Learn or be trained in winter driving skills

Whether you're driving across town, or across the province, it's important that you and your vehicle are prepared for winter conditions.

Telehealth has been available at the clinic for a few months now. If you have a follow up appointment with a specialist down island, check to see if Telehealth is an option. This can save you a long trip to Victoria. If it is the first time seeing a particular specialist, they almost always want to see you in person. However, follow up appointments can usually be done through Telehealth.

Flu and Cold season is upon us. Please remember to wash your hands regularly and cough/ sneeze into your elbow. This helps to prevent disease transmission. Parents, it is also important to teach this to children.

Garden Club News




Did you know there is a symbiotic relationship between human health and the health of our garden soil? This is just one of the nuggets of information local gardeners took away from an informative talk at our October meeting. Master organic gardener Connie Kuramoto introduced us to several ways to improve the health of our soil by getting the balance of microbes in our gardens right. Connie provided some simple, inexpensive recipes for making bokashi compost and aerated compost teas, working with effective microorganisms, and turning nettles, horsetail, and comfrey into mineral-rich herbal teas.

According to the *Old Farmer's Almanac*, the optimal time to plant garlic is during the waning moon in October, between the last day of the full moon and the first day of the new moon, this year, between the 14th and 27th. If you didn't get your garlic planted in October though, it is not too late to get it in. So long as the ground can be worked, garlic can be planted, but the sooner the better for larger bulbs in July.

Other fall chores include staking overwintering plants like kale and cabbage to avoid damage from winter storms. These plants will grow new leaves in early spring, providing food at a time when other veggies are scarce and we are craving something fresh and green. Now is the time to mulch garden beds with fallen leaves, or straw if you have it, to protect the soil from erosion. It is also a good idea to bag up and store dry leaves to be used as a brown material worth its weight in gold in next year's compost pile. If you still have compost, the pile should be covered now to avoid becoming waterlogged during the late fall and winter rains.

At our November 14th meeting, we will be sharing tips on winter gardening. As food activists and governments on the island increasingly focus on issues of food security, local gardeners are realizing the value of extending the growing season. With a little planning, we can produce fresh vegetables throughout the winter, and by eating **seasonal** locally produced food, we reduce our carbon footprint. By using existing natural resources—the sun and our microbe-enriched, loamy valley soil—collectively, we can do our part to address concerns about health and food security.

The Garden Club welcomes all, so please join us! There is no annual membership fee and the drop-in fee is just one looney per meeting. Meetings are held at the Heritage Hall on Sayward Road at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of the month.








Public Notice

Please be advised that Western Forest Products Inc., Mid Island Forest Operation, will be conducting a pile burning program from mid-October to November. This activity is carried out to increase the area where we can plant trees, and to reduce the fire fuel hazard in logged areas in a controlled fashion. WFP is obligated to reduce the fuel hazard near the Sayward Fire Protection District by regulation.

The Open Burning Smoke Control Regulation prescribes conditions under which this pile burning may be carried out. The Venting Index must be 'Good' on the day of ignition. Venting is a measure of how quickly smoke will disperse to the upper atmosphere. Wind direction will also be monitored. The piles that will be burned are cured (generally piled for more than four months), so that they are consumed in a short time period.

The management objective will be to eliminate any noticeable impact to air quality from this pile burning program for the residents of Sayward.
