

BE CAREFUL WHAT YOU FLUSH

The Village of Sayward is experiencing costly repairs to the Sewer System that take a lot of time for Village Staff to repair.

Many household products are labeled and marketed as DISPOSABLE and/or FLUSHABLE – this includes baby and adult personal hygiene products, along with household wipes and cleaning towelettes. Various other household items are labeled as flushable as well.

THEY ARE NOT!

Unlike toilet paper, these products **DO NOT** break down once they are flushed. They can cause blockages in your on-site sewer, especially in older pipelines that may have greases, roots, or other obstructions already existing. A repair of the on-site sewer line can leave the homeowner with a very costly sewer repair.

When these products make their way into the public sewer system, they clump together causing **VERY** large obstructions and clogs in the main collector lines and get tangled in the pump stations necessitating repair or replacement of equipment. These costly repairs are entirely preventable.

What we all can do to help...

The following items should NEVER be flushed into the sewer system



Avoid the practice of pouring fat, oil, and grease down the kitchen sink. Instead of disposing of it down the sink, dispose of it as solid waste, wipe out pans and dishes and dispose it in your trash bin. Save yourself from costly repairs and/or replacement bills – remember these costs are funded by taxpayers. Do not flush the listed items, please place them in the trash.

The Sayward Emergency Preparedness Committee are looking for some local volunteer Drone Pilots

No sign-up is required but if you feel your driveway may be hard to locate then please let us know and we'll put you on a special list.

- No rocks, no nails, no roots & no treated lumber.
- Ideally all the "butt ends" of branches are pointed the same way so they can be fed efficiently into the chipper.
- Tree trimmings must be under 16 cms in diameter and 10 m length max.
- No invasive species such as Scotch Broom, English Holly, Giant Hogwee and Knotweed.
- The contractor reserves the right not to pickup any piles that they feel does not meet these rules.
- Do not block traffic by piling debris or the road.
- Any debris brought to the end of driveways after 9 am on June 19th may not be picked up.
- Wood chips cannot be returned to residents as they are considered fuel under the FireSmart principles.
- As long as these rules are adhered there is no limit as to the amount of wood debris that will be chipped.

New Fireworks Restrictions

Effective April 5, 2022 Fireworks Regulation Bylaw No. 481, 2022 limits the use of fireworks in the Village of Sayward.

- Everyone possessing or discharging fireworks in the Village of Sayward needs a valid fireworks permit.
- A fireworks permit will only be issued for the following types of events:
- (1) Community events that are open to the general public;
- (2) Film and television events requiring the use of special effects pyrotechnic fireworks; (3) Halloween between the hours of 6pm and 10pm; and
- (4) New Year's Eve between the hours of 6pm and 12am.
- You may not buy or sell fireworks in the Village of Sayward

Every application for a Fireworks Permit shall be made to the Fire Chief at least 14 days before the date of the event using the permit application form available at the Village office or on the Village website. Once the Fire Chief has reviewed the application and the Permit fee has been paid, a Permit will be issued.

More information regarding Permit requirements can be found in the Fireworks Regulation bylaw on the Village website.

Fireworks Safet

- Choose a safe outdoor area. Ideally, it's a bare area of ground away from buildings, overhead obstructions, trees, vehicles, dry grass and other flammables.
- Have spectators watch from a safe distance of at least 20 metres.
- Use a lighting stick to light fireworks, rather than matches or lighters.
- Have a large bucket of water, sand or a garden hose ready at the fire site.
 Leave "duds" untouched for a minimum of 30 minutes.
- Dispose spent firework casings in a container of water.

Remember the 3 "Nevers

- Never point or throw fireworks at anyone or anything people, pets, cars or buildings.
- Never hold fireworks in your hand while lighting them
- Never attempt to re-light or move fireworks that fail to go off

High-Speed Internet:

Just a reminder not to risk getting caught without any high-speed internet access in the future. (A "drop" is a free fibre-to-home installation for high-speed internet, TV and telephone that will be delivered through the Strathcona Regional District's partnership with CityWest.) Long Term Care Facility:

The Comox Strathcona Regional Hospital Board (CSRHD) is comprised of all the Directors of the Strathcona Regional District and the Comox Valley Regional District. For a long time the Campbell River area has had an acute need for more long-term care beds. Vancouver Island Health Authority (VIHA) wants to build a 150 bed Long Term Care (LTC) facility in Campbell River to meet this need. Such a facility would also reduce the overcrowding of our new Campbell River Hospital by 25 beds when those 25 patients are moved out of critical care in the hospital to this new Long Term Care Facility. This is all good!

However, there is also another side to this proposal. Although the capital funding for this new structure is a 100% provincial government responsibility, VIHA has been pressuring the CSRHD Board to force local property taxpayers to chip in 40% of the cost which they claim will be \$52 million. They were present at the meeting and suggested that if we were to pay, then the provincial government would be more likely to build. At our April 28 Board meeting I argued against this financial blackmail stating that, "with this Board's encouragement the province has come to believe that if they create a health care crisis, and they have; then delay to resolve it, which they have; that then they can manipulate local government into submitting to their downloading of the costs onto the property taxpayers. VIHA is playing this Board like a fiddle".

I also pointed out that the operating costs in a LTC facility are so much less than in the hospital, that the provincial government saves approximately \$1 million per patient every 4 years. Therefore, for even just 25 beds that is \$50 million of savings over every 8 years going straight into government coffers, so they can well afford to pay for this facility as is their legislative responsibility. When it came to the final vote the CSRHD Board voted to approve the \$52 million give away with only myself and one other Director voting in opposition. The Board's press release claims that this will not cause an increase in property taxation, which at best is misleading. The money is slated to be taken from reserves, which they fail to mention will have to be replaced. The reserve fund was accumulated by overtaxing everyone in the first place, so I argued that if the \$52 million is truly surplus to our needs, then it should be returned to the taxpayers, or else requisitions should be reduced for future years. The Board refused to consider this option. But make no mistake about it, this kind of irresponsible spending by local governments is a major cause of an ever-increasing tax burden on all of us.





Alertable can notify residents, visitors, and businesses of emergencies in a timely manner to people who subscribe to receive these alerts. It can also be used to notify residents of other non-emergency items such as scheduled road closures, power outages, water and sewer alerts, and much more. This service is free.

The system is compatible with mobile phones, tablets, computers or smart speakers. It can also send alerts via text message, voice calls to land lines, and e-mail.

Garden Club News

By the time you read this, the weather will have hopefully turned warmer. In the meantime experienced gardeners will have been using their various tricks to deal with the rain and cold.

Transparent plastic caps have been in short supply this year but four liter milk jugs with the bottom cut off will protect the young plants. Even now these will

help with the very tender varieties like cucumbers. On a sunny day it is a good idea to remove them during the day. Putting down a temporary layer of clear plastic will help to warm up the soil.

Peas don't germinate well in the cold. You can put them in a bowl on a layer of paper towel and cover them with water. Once they are soaked you can drain off the excess water and put the bowl in a plastic bag to avoid cooling by evaporation. Check daily and when sprouted plant before the little "tails" get too long.

The Garden Club held a very successful spring plant and seed sale in May thanks to the generous donations by members and the support of the community. The funds go to provide plants for the planters at the mail boxes and to pay for out-of-town speakers. If you have any suggestions for speakers please let us know.

The club meets on the second Thursday of the month at 1:00 outside at the Heritage Hall. Experienced and novice gardeners are always welcome. Please join us.
