Re: Potential for Drought Conditions in 2024

Please be advised that streamflow and groundwater monitoring data along with the <u>snow conditions</u> being reported regularly by the <u>BC River Forecast Centre</u> (RFC) suggest it is possible that the drought conditions experienced across the province in recent years will persist again into this year. Based on these early indicators, we recommend local governments prepare for an elevated risk of experiencing drought in 2024.

The Province has several online resources to support local governments through drought conditions. The <u>BC Drought and Water Scarcity Response Plan</u> provides an overview of drought response in the province, including management responsibilities, pre-drought preparedness, descriptions of the provincial drought levels and the potential regulatory actions that may be taken. This plan is updated annually, so please look for the updated 2024 plan on the <u>BC drought information web site</u> mid-April.

The Province produces datasets to better understand water availability regionally including:

- Map of 7-Day Average Streamflow displays all Water Survey of Canada streamflow gauges in BC.
- The <u>Drought Information Portal</u> displays regional Drought Levels based on indicators.

To translate these regional-scale drought levels to a more local scale, the Ministry of Water, Land and Resource Stewardship (WLRS), in partnership with the Regional Health Authorities and the Ministry of Health, will be reaching out directly to drinking water suppliers across the province to collect water supply status information. These surveys will be conducted at regular intervals and will help to understand the state of drinking water supplies throughout the impending 2024 drought season and streamline communication from drinking water suppliers to the provincial government to determine communities at risk of water supply issues and where provincial support is needed.

To improve drought resilience, all local governments should be monitoring water supplies to gauge their current conditions and anticipate future water scarcity, as well as prepare a water conservation plan. This <u>Water Conservation Guide</u> provides guidance on creating these plans, which should be kept current and reviewed and updated at least every five years. An up-to-date water conservation plan endorsed by a local government's Council or Board is required for water and wastewater application-based capital funding through the Ministry of Municipal Affairs.

To understand trends in water availability, it is important to have procedures in place to regularly monitor available information about water conditions, including information provided through the BC <u>Drought Information Portal</u> and Water Survey of Canada streamflow gauges relevant to your area. If your water sources (raw water storage and inflows, or groundwater levels) are not gauged, consider establishing a water supply monitoring program, which will enable you to quantify the water available to your community and adjust water use accordingly. Professional consultants can help design an appropriate monitoring program for your systems.

A Water Conservation Plan can help you develop, or update, a Water Conservation Bylaw, which may limit water use seasonally or in stages based on projections of water availability. As well as bylaws that implement water use restrictions, bylaws can be tied to permit approval processes, such as building or plumbing bylaws that offset additional water demands through conservation improvements or require water efficient or drought tolerant landscaping. Public outreach and communication can be an effective tool to explain the importance of water conservation, its impacts and what individuals need to do to participate. Universal water metering is also a very useful tool for demand management. If you have water metering, consider pricing structures that encourage water conservation. Other examples of opportunities for conservation can include rebates towards low flow appliances and rain barrels, or the elimination of once-through cooling systems in commercial buildings.

It is helpful to consider options for the future, even if these cannot be ready for 2024. Capital projects that improve drought resilience include leakage reduction, universal water metering, water reuse or reclamation, increased raw water storage and development of secondary or back-up water sources.

Caretaking the natural cycle that results in recharge of local water sources can also ensure that fresh water is retained or returned to local waterbodies and aquifers to maintain availability of drinking water and environmental flows. Consider how to protect watersheds and retain and absorb stormwater runoff. Low impact development, permeable infrastructure, and natural assets can retain valuable water. The following sites have associated resources:

The Infrastructure Planning Grant Program (IPGP) is available to local governments to plan, design and manage infrastructure. The IPGP provides an opportunity to obtain grant funding up to \$10,000 to develop or update a Water Conservation Plan, or to plan capital projects that improve drought resilience. Program information is available on the Ministry's website.

Dear Mayor Mark Baker:

On April 5, 2024, I introduced new legislation, Bill 16, intended to support local governments in their efforts to build more affordable and liveable communities. The proposed legislation strengthens the shift towards pro-active zoning by providing local governments with new authorities to secure affordable housing units and site-level infrastructure in new developments and to enable municipalities to adopt bylaws to help tenants facing eviction from redevelopment.

These changes are part of the broader set of local government changes that started in fall 2023 with Bills 44, 46 and 47 to help get more housing built faster while enabling updated and new tools to effectively fund the costs of infrastructure and amenities to support increased housing supply and growth. Those changes will result in fewer site-by-site rezonings, which many local governments currently rely on to secure key outcomes such as affordable housing, tenant protections, and site-level infrastructure. If passed, Bill 16 will provide authorities to local governments to secure these outcomes within a pro-active zoning framework.

Bill 16 will establish a new **Inclusionary Zoning** tool that allows local governments to require affordable housing in new development without relying on the rezoning process and to accept cash-in-lieu of affordable housing or affordable units on a different site by agreement. Local governments will need to undertake a financial feasibility analysis and consultation when developing Inclusionary Zoning bylaws to ensure that enough density is provided to offset the costs of providing affordable housing. They will also need to report annually on the outcomes of Inclusionary Zoning bylaws for transparency and to support provincial monitoring of implementation.

The **Density Bonus** tool will be updated to clarify how it is used and to help ensure it works effectively with Inclusionary Zoning. Financial feasibility analysis and consultation will now be required to ensure that Density Bonus provisions are achievable and calibrated to local conditions. The proposed legislation clarifies that local governments can accept cash-in-lieu of affordable units and/or units on a different site. It also clarifies use of Density Bonus authorities in Transit-Oriented Areas (TOAs).

By mid-2025 (or a later date prescribed by regulation) local governments will be required to update all existing density bonus bylaws to comply with the new legislation, and density bonus authorities will only be able to be used above the minimum allowable densities in TOAs.

Bill 16 will also provide municipalities with the authority to develop **Tenant Protection Bylaws** that are implemented at the development permit stage.

Municipalities will be able to withhold development permits until owners meet the conditions of the tenant protection bylaws. In addition, municipalities will be able to request information about the effect of proposed redevelopments on tenants, which will give municipalities more data to design tenant protection bylaws.

Lastly, Bill 16 proposes new authorities for local governments to secure site-level infrastructure to service new development without relying on the rezoning process. These changes will give local governments clearer authority to require **works and services** for infill developments (i.e. at the building permit stage). As well, the legislation provides local governments with an expanded list of works and services they can require, including, for example, benches, street lamps, parklets, and sustainable design features like rain gardens. Local governments will also be able to require developments provide land adjacent to developments for new or upgraded roads without subdivision to support alternative transportation, accessibility and safety (such as wider sidewalks, bike lanes, and street trees). The legislation also gives local governments a new authority to define and require **Transportation Demand Management** measures within new developments, which can include, for example, charging stations or secure bicycle parking facilities.

If Bill 16 is passed, local governments can use the capacity funding distributed in January to adopt these new tools.

The Province will continue to engage and collaborate with local governments to support implementation of the new legislative tools and requirements. Later this year, we will provide guidance for adoption of the new authorities: Inclusionary Zoning and Density Bonus, Works and Services and Transportation Demand Management, and Tenant Protection Bylaws. In the coming months, we will also be providing further guidance to support the implementation of the fall 2023 legislation, including guidance on the Interim Housing Needs Reports and comprehensive guidance on the development finance tools.

I appreciate all the work being undertaken to transition to a pro-active zoning planning framework and to help get more homes built for British Columbians.

From the Forestry 1 (F-1) to the zones as shown on Appendix "A" forming an integral part of this Bylaw.
